1.9 CRR Types

CRR Types

CRR Obligation

 Entitles CRR Holder to a CRR Payment if Congestion is in the same direction of the CRR and requires a charge if Congestion is in the opposite direction of the CRR

CRR Option

- Entitles CRR Holder to a CRR Payment if Congestion is in the same direction as the CRR, but requires no payment if Congestion is in the opposite direction of the CRR
- Currently CRR Options are only available to Project Sponsors of a Merchant Transmission Facility that do not elect some form of regulatory cost recovery



1.10 CRR Terms

CRR Terms

Terms of CRRs

- Seasons are defined on a quarterly basis
 - Season 1 = Jan, Feb and Mar
 - Season 2 = Apr, May and June
 - Season 3 = Jul, Aug and Sep
 - Season 4 = Oct, Nov and Dec
- Long Term CRRs extend nine years after annual term for a total of ten years (Allocation only)
- Months are calendar months (e.g., January, February, ...)

Example

A PTP CRR for season 1, on-peak applies to all hours in season 1 that are defined as on-peak



1.11 CRR Time of Use

CRR Time of Use

CRR Time of Use Definition

- The time-of-use period definition is consistent with WECC and NERC
 - _ WECC = Western Electric Coordination Council
 - NERC = National Electric Reliability Council
- The on-peak period
 - Consists of the hours from 6 am (HE7) to 10 pm (HE22) for Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, (assuming these days are non-holidays)



1.12 CRR Time of Use

CRR Time of Use

CRR Time of Use Definition (cont.)

- · The off-peak period
 - Consists of the hours from 10 pm (HE23) to 6 am (HE6) for Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday
 - All 24 hours for days that are Sunday and holidays
 - Holidays are New Year's day, Memorial Day, Independence day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day
 - If the holiday falls on a Sunday, the first following Monday is treated as if it were a Sunday (i.e., all hours are off-peak)

1.13 CRRs are Financial Rights

CRRs are Financial Rights

- A Market Participant does not need a CRR to Bid Energy into the Day-Ahead Market (DAM)
- If a Market Participant has a CRR and Bids in Energy, the Energy Bid does not need to be consistent with the CRR in terms of CRR Sink or CRR Source locations or MW quantities
- On the flip-side, a Market Participant does not need to Bid in Energy to hold a CRR
- The CRR only settles on the Marginal Cost of Congestion (MCC) of the Day-Ahead Locational Marginal Pricing (LMP) for each respective hour, adjusted for any shortfall between what is collected in the DAM and what is to be paid out to CRR holders, by constraint.



1.25 Simultaneous Feasibility Test

Simultaneous Feasibility Test

- This optimization formulation is used in both the CRR Allocation and CRR Auction process
 - The objective function is slightly different in each
 - The topology and constraints are the same
- The objective functions in the CRR Allocation and CRR Auction process
 - <u>CRR Allocation</u>: Starting from January 2011 monthly CRR process the objective function has been modified to utilize the weighted least squares (WLS)
 - <u>CRR Auction</u>: the objective function used in the CRR Auction process is to maximize the bid based value of the awarded



1.26 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Allocation

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Allocation

 For the monthly/annual allocation tiers, the objective function is to minimize the weighted least squares (WLS)

$$\min\left(\sum_{i=1}^{N} \alpha_{i} \left(\overline{X}_{i} - X_{i}\right)^{2}\right)$$

- With WLS there is a sharing of the reduction as compared to the old methodology which was to maximize the CRR MW amount in which the most effective control variable is reduced/removed first.
- Since it is important to understand how shift factors work to understand the WLS optimization we will wait until after the discussion on shift factors to go through an example of how WLS is applied.



1.27 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Auction

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Auction

- For the monthly/annual auction process, the objective function is to maximize the bid value of the awarded CRRs
- With the allocation process, participants only request MW amounts for the CRR source/sink pairs being nominated while for the auction participants also provide a bid curve.
- A simple example of how the auction optimization works is provided after the example on WLS later in this presentation





Simultaneous Feasibility Test


- The CRR Allocation and CRR Auction process will provide CRRs for terms of one season/TOU and one month/ TOU, so choosing the proper set of underlying data for the SFT can be difficult
- When setting up the process for the CRR Allocation or CRR Auction the following data must be used within the SFT process
 - FNM topology (from which the shift factors are derived)
 - APNodes and their allocation factors
 - Constraint limits
- Given a CRR Allocation or CRR Auction process that will create a bundle of CRRs for a particular term/TOU
 - Every CRR created will be tested by an SFT that has one FNM, one set of allocation factors for each APNode, and one set of Constraint Limits

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Full Network Model

- . The FNM for the Long Term process will include sixty (60) percent of the Seasonal Available CRR Capacity that is used in the annual
- The FNM for the annual process will include seventy five (75) percent of the Seasonal Available CRR Capacity that is in service for the start of the annual CRR allocation and auction processes
- For the monthly processes, the FNM will include one hundred (100) percent of the Monthly Available CRR Capacity associated with transmission facilities that are in-service when the monthly allocation and auction process begins.
 - We will not model "expected" upgrades



1.32 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Constraints

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Constraints

Constraint limits used in the <u>Day-Ahead</u> operation of the power system include limits placed on observable (measurable) variables in the power system such as:

- · Flows on individual or groups of branches
 - Also enforced under contingency analysis
- · Generation levels in certain areas of the system
- Voltage levels
- Relationships between Generation levels, Load levels, voltage levels and branch (or branch group) flows



1.33 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Constraints

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Constraints

- Constraints enforced in the CRR process should be consistent with those used in Integrated Forward Market (IFM), as much as possible, but due to timing differences and the use of a DC model in the CRR process there are some inherent differences
 - Coordinate with IFM team on Interface, branch group and nomogram constraints, thermal constraints and contingency constraints recognizing timing and modeling differences
- Constraint limit values will be based on operating procedures utilized by the IFM
- Adjustments will be made to constraint limits to take into consideration the absence of reactive power and losses
 - Monitored facilities limits reduced to account for reactive power (3%) and losses (2%)

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1.34 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Constraints

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Constraints


- Adjustments made to the constraint limits used in the monthly CRR processes.
 - Global De-rate Factor (GDF) This adjustment is reflected through the monitored facilities to account for unplanned outages and the impact on internal transmission elements
 - Local De-Rate Factor (LDFR) This adjustment is reflected through the interface limits file to account for unplanned outages and is adjusted on an interface-by-interface basis.
 - Outages are modeled in the monthly processes whereas with the annual process all lines are assumed to be in-service unless a long-term outage is known prior to the running of the annual process.

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - APNodes

- · APNodes can also be defined for non-bidding purposes
 - A Trading Hub is not bid into the IFM, but an LMP is still
- · The CRR Sources and CRR Sinks are modeled as either PNodes or APNodes in the CRR SFT process


Simultaneous Feasibility Test - APNodes

Two Attributes of Aggregated Pricing Node


- A set of two or more PNodes
- Each PNode provides a mapping back to the underlying FNM
 - An LMP is calculated by the IFM for each PNode in this set
- · A set of allocation factors, one allocation factor for each **PNode**
 - These are also referred to as either Load or Generator Distribution Factors for Load or Generator Aggregation Points
 - For the CRR SFT, they are generally called allocation factors
 - The properties of the allocation factors are:
 - ightharpoonup Each allocation factors is greater than or equal to 0.0
 - > Each allocation factors is less than or equal to 1.0
- California ISO The allocation factors for a particular APNode sum to 1.0

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Distribution Factors

Distribution Factors

- Distribution Factors for Load Aggregation Points will be based on historical load patterns as seen through the running of the DAM - applies to:
 - Default Load (DLAP) Aggregation Points
 - Sub Load (SLAP) Aggregation Points
 - Metered Subsystem Load (MLAP) Aggregation Points
 - Custom Load (CLAP) Aggregation Points
- **Trading Hubs**
 - Distribution factors are based on the weighted average generation output, for the prior full year of historical data, of all Generating Units within a Trading Hub



Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Trading Hub

Trading Hub

- · For the CRR Allocation, CRR nominations with Trading Hubs as sources will be disaggregated into Point-to-Point CRRs each of whose CRR Source is a Generating Unit PNode that is an element of the Trading Hub
 - Each nomination will equal the MW quantity of the CRR nomination multiplied by the weighting factor of the corresponding Generating
- The Trading Hub allocation factors will be updated once a year to coincide with the CRR annual processes
- Due to disaggregation of the Trading Hub and the .001 MW limit for CRRs, it is possible that the total disaggregated MW amount could be less than the nominated amount after the SFT is run






1.43 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Trading Hub

Simultaneous Feasibility Test – Trading Hub Starting from January 2011 CRR monthly process for all allocation markets, trading hub CRRs are re-aggregated after the SFT process The re-aggregation is performed to reduce the number of awarded CRRs The process of re-aggregation is explained here with a simple example Consider a simple trading hub which consists of five PNodes A through E the disaggregation and re-aggregation of CRRs are shown in the following slide

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Outages

Outages

- · Scheduled outages may be considered in the annual process if the transmission facilities will be out-of-service for several weeks over a season, otherwise, all lines are considered in-service for annual process
- For the monthly process, the ISO will be applying selected 30 days' rule outages together with an appropriate global de-rating factor to the model to account for unplanned outages
- · The detailed process is included in the CRR BPM




1.46 Simultaneous Feasibility Test – Shift Factors

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Shift Factors

- Shift Factors are also known by other names
 - Power transfer distribution factors (PTDFs)
 - Power distribution coefficients (PDCs)
 - Effectiveness factors
 - Impedance factors
- This shift factor definition is:
 - SFji = shift factor for bus i (with respect to the reference location) on constraint j
 - i.e., the incremental amount of power flow on constraint j when an additional unit of power is injected at bus i and withdrawn from the reference location
- Shift factors are dependent upon the network topology of the FNM from which they are derived

1.48 Simultaneous Feasibility Test -Shift Factor

Simultaneous Feasibility Test –Shift Factor CRR1: 100 MW PTP CRR nomination from Bus 1 to Bus 2 CRR2: 200 MW PTP CRR nomination from Bus 3 to Bus 4 Flow on Branch AB (from Bus A to Bus B) MW quantity × Shift factor CRR1: 100 × 50% = 50 MW CRR2: 50 × 20% = 10 MW Total flow on the Branch AB (from Bus A to Bus B)

- 50 MW + 10 MW = 60 MW > 50 MW Limit

1.49 Simultaneous Feasibility Test -Shift Factor

Simultaneous Feasibility Test -Shift Factor

- · Let's explore the different alternatives for relieving the overload and see the impact of each alternative on the objective function
- · There are three alternatives
 - Use only CRR1 to relieve the Constraint overload
 - Use only CRR2 to relieve the Constraint overload
 - Use a combination of CRR1 and CRR2 to relieve the Constraint overload



1.50 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Shift Factor

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Shift Factor What if the MW quantity from CRR1 is reduced • The impact that CRR1 has (i.e., a change in the MW quantity of CRR1) on the flow on the Constraint


- If the MW quantity from CRR1 is increased by 1 MW what is the increase to the flow on

 - If the MW quantity from CRR1 is decreased by 1 MW what is the decrease to the flow on
 - ➤ (-1 MW) × 50 % = 0.5 MW
- · To get 10 MW off of Branch AB we will need to reduce the MW quantity from CRR1 by 20 MW
 - 10 divided by 50% = 20 MW
- Resultant flow on Branch AB
- (100 − 20) × 50% + 50 × 20% = 50 MW California ISO

1.51 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Shift Factor

Simultaneous Feasibility Test — Shift Factor What if the MW quantity from CRR2 is reduced • Go through a similar process that was applied to CRR1 • To get 10 MW off of Branch AB the amount of the MW quantity from CRR2 needs to be reduced by 10 divided by 20% = 50 MW • Resultant flow on Branch AB 100 × 50% + (50 − 50) × 20% = 50 MW • In this case CRR2 is reduced to zero to relieve the constraint Colifornio ISO

1.53 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Shift Factor

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Shift Factor

- How to determine which nomination or bid will get reduced depends on the optimization formula that is being used
- As discussed earlier in this presentation there are two basic objective functions used by the CRR System, one for the allocation and another for the auction;
 - CRR Allocation Weighted Least Squares
 - CRR Auction Maximize bid based value of the awarded CRRs



1.54 Simultaneous Feasibility Test – Weighed Least Square

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Weighed Least Square

 The WLS formula for deriving the reduction of a nomination is noted below

 \overline{X}_i denote nominated MW for CRR i

 $SF_{i,k}$ be shift factor of CRR i wrt constraint k

 $\Delta V_{k,i}$ Reduction in each nomination be

 ΔV Total overload

 $\Delta V_{k,l}$ reduction in flow because of CRR i

 $\Delta V_{k,i} = R_{i,k} \cdot \Delta V$


$$R_{i,k} = \frac{\overline{X}_{i} \cdot SF_{i,k}^{2}}{\sum_{i=1}^{N} (\overline{X}_{i} \cdot SF_{i,k}^{2})}, \text{ where } \sum_{i=1}^{N} R_{i,k} = 1$$



1.55 Simultaneous Feasibility Test – Weighed Least Square

Simultaneous Feasibility Test — Weighed Least Square Prior to WLS the objective function for the allocation was to maximize the number of awarded CRRs, which reduced nominations with the highest SF first. In the WLS formulation, the reduction on the flow on the constraint is pro-rated based on squares of the shift factors and the weight of the nomination amount WLS distributes the curtailment across all CRR nominations that are effective in relieving the congestion, and thus spreads the curtailment among multiple allocation participants The WLS was implemented as a more equitable formulation for the CRR allocation process; in that CRR nominations share the available capacity

1.56 Simultaneous Feasibility Test – WLS Example



1.57 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Allocation

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Allocation

- Since CRR1 has a SF of 0.5 and CRR2 has a SF of 0.2 on the constraint, these combined nominations create an overload of 10MW ((50 -(100*0.5) - (50*0.2)).
- If the objective function were still based on maximizing awarded MWs then CRR1, since it is most effective in relieving the constraint, would be reduced by 20MW to achieve feasibility (0.5*20 = 10).
- With WLS the first step is to calculate the sharing of the 10MW overload between the two nominations by taking each of the nominated amounts times the square of the respective SF and divide by the sum of all nominations times the respective square of the SF
- For CRR1 the result is $100*0.5^2 / 100*0.5^2 + 50*0.2^2$, which equals 25/25+2=25/27=.9259



1.58 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Allocation

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Allocation

- For CRR2 the result is $50*0.2^2 / 100*0.5^2 + 50*0.2^2$, which equals 2/25+2=2/27=.0741
- CRR1 share of reduction is 10*.9259 = 9.259MW
- CRR2 share of reduction is 10*.0741 = 0.741MW
- The above values are the amounts before taking into consideration the effectiveness (SF) of each nomination on the constraint, therefore the last step is to adjust the reduction for each nomination's SF. In other words, what do I need to adjust the nomination amount by in order to get the required reduction and relieve the constraint.



1.59 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Allocation

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Allocation

- CRR1 adjustment is (1/0.5) * 9.259 = 18.518
- CRR2 adjustment is (1/0.2) * 0.741 = 3.705
- CRR1 award is 100 18.518 = 81.482
- CRR2 award is 50 3.705 = 46.295
- Constraint limit of 50MW is now met, which is equal to the awarded amounts for the two new CRRs times the respective shift factor of each CRR.
- CRR1 flow contribution = 40.741 (81.482*0.5)
- CRR2 flow contribution = 9.259 (46.295*0.2)
- Total flow contribution = 40.741 + 9.259 = 50MW

1.60 Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Allocation

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Allocation

- Notice that the WLS objective function results in a sharing of the reduction, but consideration is given to the effectiveness (shift factor) of the nomination on relieving the constraint as well as the nomination amount.
- CRR1 with the higher shift factor took a larger share of the reduction, even though its nomination amount was twice that of CRR2. The reduction for CRR1 was 18.518% of the nomination while for CRR2 the reduction was 7.41% of the nomination amount.

Simultaneous Feasibility Test - Auction

- To provide a simple example of how the auction optimization would work let's assume the same set up as described in the allocation example with the addition of the two bid curves shown below in the format (MW,\$):
 - CRR1 (0,40), (100,40)
 - CRR2 (0,50), (50,50)
- As noted in the previous allocation example there is only 50MW of capacity available (assuming no counter-flow positions) on the identified constraint.
- Also from the previous example we know that these two bids contribute to 60MW of flows across the constraint, based on the respective shift factors, so the CRR System needs to determine which bids are awarded and at what levels.


- · Since the auction optimization formula wants to maximize the bid value of the awarded CRRs the software will start lowering the lowest valued bids until it no longer has a binding constraint. In this example there is only a single constraint and only two bids so it is fairly simple. In reality this is not the case and there are multiple constraints that need to be resolved with thousands of bids to consider.
- The software needs to reduce flows on the constraint by 10MW, so since the CRR1 bid is the lower valued bid and has a SF of 0.5 the software will reduce the CRR1 bid by 20MW (20 * 0.5 = 10) to eliminate the binding constraint.
- The results will be that CRR2 is awarded the full 50MW bid, with CRR1 being awarded 80MW. The clearing price would be the marginal bid which is \$40.









- The ISO will then run the SFT process for each seasonal tierone (one SFT for the on-peak period and one SFT for the offpeak period, for each season)

Once a Candidate CRR Holder has registered and becomes eligible to participate in the CRR Allocation process the ISO will require the entity to submit either historical or forecast Load data

- Which is used to determine either the Seasonal CRR Eligible Quantity or Monthly CRR Eligible Quantity, respectively
- For entities with load that fluctuates based on hydrological conditions, monthly data can be forecast or historical.

Seasonal CRR Eligible Quantity

- Seasonal CRR Process

 - Subtract load served by TOR and ETC to determine the Adjusted Load Metric (ALM)
 - Multiply result by 75%
 - This value is the Seasonal CRR Eligible Quantity





 - The total quantity of Seasonal CRRs allocated to that LSE in the previous annual CRR Allocation; plus the net quantity of load migration CRRs associated with the immediately preceding Seasonal CRR Allocations for the corresponding season, time of use, and CRR sink location;, minus the quantity of Long Term CRRs allocated in the immediately preceding Seasonal CRR Allocation for each season, time of use period and CRR Sink;, and minus the net MW amount of load migration CRRs valid for each

- Tier LT is limited to a maximum of 50% of its Adjusted Load Metric (ALM), minus the quantity of previously allocated Long Term CRRs that are valid for that year.
- CRR nominations are all Signature validated
 - Meaning the CRR source-sink pairs have to have been allocated in the immediately PNP and cannot exceed the MW amounts allocated
- One year prior to the expiration of LT CRRs an election is required to either re-nominate in the next year's PNP or in the LT process.
 - For example, when running the 2020 annual process we also run the 2021
 -2029 LT process. If the LT CRRs expire in 2020 then the election is to renominate in the 2021 PNP next year or the 2021 LT in the current year



- There are two basic types of transmission rights that the ISO models through the CRR process
 - Transmission Ownership Rights (TORs)
 - Existing Transmission Contracts (ETCs)
- These rights are defined through the Transmission Rights Transmission Curtailment (TRTC) procedures
- When the ISO models these rights the intent is to remove capacity, which has a "perfect hedge", so that CRRs are not allocated or auctioned on this capacity
- · The ISO holds these CRRs not the rights holder





Introduction to Load Migration

What is Load Migration?

- Load Migration is the process of tracking the transfer of load between a pair of Load Serving Entities (LSEs).
- LSEs may have CRRs in different Utility Distribution Company (UDC) territories, but only those sinking at a UDC's location where the migrated load is placed will be considered in the corresponding transfer. In other words, an LSE losing load only in UDC1 would only lose CRRs sinking in UDC1.
- The calculation for the transfer of allocated CRRs held by the load-losing LSE is computed for each source to sink combination in the load-losing LSE's portfolio of allocated CRRs, by season and TOU. Only CRRs with the same path can be
 Colifornia Deted.

Introduction to Load Migration (cont'd.)

What is Load Migration? (cont'd.)

- Load Migration only tracks instances where a customer moves within a UDC service area, the closing or opening of an account are not tracked as load migration between LSEs.
- It is designed to transfer the appropriate quantity of CRRs between LSEs involved in load migration. In other words, when load moves from one LSE to another, allocated CRRs must be transferred to follow the load.
- Load migration only applies to LSEs, and only for annual allocated CRRs (not monthly allocated CRRs), i.e., seasonal and LT CRRs will be transferred.
- The ISO is using a one-to-one percentage relationship to determine the CRR transfers.



1.99 Tracking Load Migration

Tracking Load Migration

- The ISO will receive monthly records from each UDC reflecting transfer of customers between LSEs.
- UDCs are required to submit data in three different files, usually on the 20th of each month.
 - Direct Access Service Request (DASR) summary files containing the information about the net positive number of end-use customers per customer class transferring from one LSE to another LSE.
 - Number of customers (in each customer class) of each LSE doing business in their territories.
 - Average consumption rates for each customer class (once a year, each July).



1.100 Tracking Load Migration (cont'd.)

Tracking Load Migration (cont'd.)

- Load Migration adjustment process is on a monthly basis
- The Load Migration Tool (LMT) calculations for CRR transfers usually take place on the 20th of each month for the transactions reported in the DASR summary records, which have the effective start date as of the first day of the next month.
- The DASR summary records should include the customers completing transfers within the month plus customers which completed transfers prior to the current month but have not been reported in previous DASR summary records.



1.101 Tracking Load Migration (cont'd.)

Tracking Load Migration (cont'd.)

- The effective start date is the effective start date for the CRR transfer, which is the first day of the next month.
- For example, for a file to be submitted on April 20th for May 2012 CRR monthly process, the number of customers will include the customers completing transfers between April 1st and April 20th, (some cut-off determined by the UDC to submit by April 20th) 2012 (inclusive), plus customers which completed transfers before April 1st, 2012 but were never reported in previous DASR summary records. The effective start date will be May 1st, 2012



- Sell offers at a negative price will require collateral up to the maximum amount the seller is willing to pay.
- The price at each MW level indicates the minimum price the seller is willing to be paid for the next MW
- The MCP for clearing that MW level will not be less than the bid price at that MW level
- The MCP may be more than the bid price at that MW level
- Actual sales price for a CRR will be equal to or less than the maximum purchase amount
- Credit margin is not considered for sell offers

Pre-Auction Credit Requirement Overview (cont'd.)

- · Maximum credit exposure of a positive buy bid is the maximum value of the bid quantity (MW) multiplied by the sum of bid price corresponding to the bid quantity and the Credit Margin of the CRR
- Maximum credit exposure of a negative buy bid is the maximum submitted bid quantity (MW) multiplied by the Credit Margin. Since CRRs awarded with a negative clearing price have their proceeds passed directly to the bidder's collateral account the bid price is not considered.
- Aggregate Credit Limit must equal or exceed the greater of \$100K (monthly)/\$500K(annual) and the sum of the maximum credit exposures of all MP's bids submitted Scalifornia ISO







CRR Holding Requirements: Overview

- Once CRRs have been acquired, either through the CRR Allocation, CRR Auction or secondary trades, each CRR Holder must maintain sufficient secured collateral to cover the CRR Holding requirements.
- · CRR Holding Requirements consist of two components:
 - Credit Requirement
 - Credit Margin
- Overall holding requirement is assessed for the whole portfolio of CRRs of each holder
 - Excess secured credit from some CRRs can offset credit requirements of other CRRs in the same portfolio
 - Excess secured credit of the CRR portfolio cannot offset non-CRR credit requirements





CRR Holding Requirements: Calculation - Groups CRR Holding Requirements Groups: Short Term Auction group = CRRs obtained from annual and monthly Auctions, and SRS trades. Short-term Allocation group = (1) CRRs obtained from monthly/seasonal allocation process, (2) load migration CRRs for load transfers of CRRs from seasonal allocations (3) CRRs obtained from long-term allocations which have remaining effective periods less than a year. Long-term Allocation group (LT1) = (1) CRRs obtained from long-term allocations which have remaining effective periods longer than a year but less than nine years. (2) Load migration CRRs created for load transfer of CRRs originated from markets in the LT1 group. Long-term Allocation group (LT2) = (1) CRRs obtained from long-term allocations which their effective periods have not been started. (2) Load migration CRRs created for load transfer of CRRs originated from markets in the LT2 group Long-term Allocation group (LT3) = (1) CRRs obtained from long-term allocations which their effective periods have not been started and will be started a year later than long-term allocations in LT2. (2) Load migration CRRs created for load transfer of CRRs originated from markets in the LT3 group. Financial group tracks only the selling of annual allocated CRRs, including CRRs from load migration being traded.



Terminate all CRR agreements with the defaulting CRR Holder


Exclude the holder from CRR Allocation or CRR Auction until all defaults have been cured

1.138 Secondary Registration System - Overview

Secondary Registration System - Overview

- The Secondary Registration System (SRS) is built into the CRR System to help facilitate the trading of CRRs through a bilateral mechanism
- Information about CRRs that an entity wants to buy and sell is made available on a "bulletin board" in SRS
- In order to have access to the SRS and to effect trades both entities must be fully registered
- The SRS does not settle transactions but merely facilitates the recording of the owner of record
- Financial settlement is done outside of the SRS


- As part of the CRR Holding Requirements the CRR System will perform a credit check on both the trading ("selling) and receiving ("buying") parties in a SRS trade.
- This credit check will ensure that the receiving party has sufficient collateral to add the SRS trade to their CRR portfolio
- This credit check will also ensure that the trading party, if the CRR is positively valued, has sufficient collateral to remove the SRS trade from their CRR portfolio


1.142 CRR Related Grid Management Charges

CRR Related Grid Management Charges • There are two types of CRR related GMC charges: CRR Services Charge and CRR Bid Transaction Fee. • CRR Services Charge (Charge Code 4562) — It is designed to recover costs the ISO incurs for running the CRR markets. — It is applied to each CRR holder's net MW holdings of CRRs that are applicable to each hour. — The rate is calculated by dividing the annual GMC revenue requirement allocated to CRR service category by forecasted annual sum of awarded MW of CRRs per hour. S Colifornio ISO

1.143 CRR Related Grid Management Charges

CRR Related Grid Management Charges • CRR Bid Transaction Fee (Charge Code 4516) — It is designed to recover CRR costs on a transactional basis. — It applies to both the CRR allocation process and the CRR auction process. — The rate is applied on a per nomination or per bid basis, without consideration of the number of segments. — GMC rates can be updated intra-year to reflect actual cost collection.
