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ISO reschedules public meeting on regional energy market studies

FOLSOM, Calif. – The California Independent System Operator (ISO) is hosting a twoday public meeting on May 24 and 25 to review preliminary results of studies on the potential impacts of a regional electric grid across the western United States.

The preliminary study findings will be published Friday, May 20, on the ISO website.

The studies are required under Senate Bill 350, the Clean Energy and Pollution Reduction Act, signed into law last year. The law's main provision establishes California's goal of reaching a 50 percent renewable portfolio standard by 2030. SB 350 also directs the ISO to complete studies to assess a regional grid's potential impacts to ratepayers, California's economy and workforce, the environment, disadvantaged communities, greenhouse gas emissions, and the reliability and integration of renewable energy resources.

The meeting will be from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday, May 24, and Wednesday, May 25, at the ISO headquarters, 250 Outcropping Way, Folsom, CA. Those planning to attend in person must register by email to <u>SMC@caiso.com</u> by 5 p.m. on May 20.
