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Severe storm triggers transmission emergency; conservation urged

Loss of high-voltage power line reduces electricity flow on Path 15

FOLSOM, Calif. – The California Independent System Operator Corporation (ISO) declared a transmission emergency today after an early storm system battering California with heavy rain and strong wind gusts knocked a high-voltage line to the ground near Moss Landing.

Northern Californians are urged to conserve electricity through 10:00 p.m. tonight. The 500 kilovolt line impacts the flow on Path 15, which serves as a major transmission link between Northern and Southern California.

The amount of electricity that can flow on Path 15 is reduced to about a third of what it normally is rated to carry. Although customers are experiencing numerous localized power outages, the transmission emergency did not cause additional system disruptions. However, conservation is needed as the ISO manages the peak demand for the day at about 6:00 p.m.
